ARABS SAID TO RELY ON ATTRITION WAR

Leaders of 5 States at Amman Are Reported in Accord on Tactics in Palestine

AMMAN, Trans-Jordan, April 30 (UP)-Trans-Jordan, Iraq, Syria, Lebanon and Egypt agreed today on a long-term military campaign to wear down the Jews in Palestine, reliable sources said tonight.

Arab countries, at a momentous conference here, were reported to have decided against the idea of a blitzkrieg campaign in Pales-tine because they lack the tens of thousands, of multitained and thousands of well-trained and well-equipped troops needed for

wen-equipped troops needed for such an operation. Hence they decided on a war of attrition or wearing down, sources close to them said. It was added that the military leaders did not

It was added that the military leaders did not rule out the possi-bility that the Jews themselves might try a blitzkrieg campaign as soon as the British mandate expires on May 15. Political leaders of the Arab states held a meeting of their own coincidentally with the mili-tary meeting. They were said to have agreed on complete unity to fight for Pal-estine.

Steps Reported Agreed Upon

The military leaders were report-ed to have decided on the follow-ing steps:

.) The Arabs would try to hold strategic positions in Palestlne after May 15 by throwing in the Trans-Jordan Arab Legion, units from the Syrian and Lebanese armies and about 4,000 Iraqi (1) troops.

(2) Egypt probably would provide complete artillery units, with officers and men, and planes with pilots and maintenance with pilots and maintenanc crews for Trans-Jordan's forces.

(3) The regular Egyptian Army will assume respo southern Palestine. will responsibility for

Qualified sources said that though there probably would not be an all-out attack by Arab regu-lars in the near future, these units would occupy various strategic po-sitions in the Arab part of Pales-

tine. At the same time irregulars would carry on guerrilla warfare. The guerrillas were to cut Jewish communication lines and disrupt consolidation of a Jewish state. It was generally agreed here that King Abdullah of Trans-Jor-dan would annex the Arab part of Pelestine to this country. Then,

dan would annex the Arab part of Palestine to this country. Then, backed by the other Arab coun-tries, he might seek an agreement with the Jews, it was said. Leaders who attended today's conferences included Regent Abdul Illah and Chief of Staff Gen. Saleh Saib of Iraq; Premier Riad, es-Solh, Defense Minister Emir Mejid Arslan and Commander in Chief Fouad Shehad of Lebanon; Pre-mier Jamil Mardam, Defense Min-ister Ahmed Sharabaty and Com-mander in Chief Ismail Safwat of Syria, and a senior Egyptian offi-cer. cer.

Leaflets Dropped to Troops

Audul Rahman Azzam Pasha, Secretary General of the Arab League, said that volunteers to fight for the Arab cause were al-ready moving toward the Holy Land from Egypt, Saudi

and Iraq. "We have a unified command." he said. "The battles will take maybe six months and maybe a year, but the Jews cannot hold out against the Arab flood." "Palestine will become a No Man's Land once the British man-

date ends and Arabs have as much right either to seize the country or restore order as anyone else."
