WASHINGTON, May 21—S. Pinkney Tuck, a career diplomat WASHINGTON, of thirty-five years' experience, resigned today as Ambassador to Egypt for "compelling reasons of personal nature." President Truman accepted the resignation, effective at the end of this month, "with deep regret."

During his long career he served as consular officer and diplomatic secretary in Europe, the Middle and Far East, and South America, being stationed variously in Con-Paris, stantinople, Alexandria, Vladivostok, Budapest, Cairo. Prague and Buenos Aires.

During the Nineteen Twenties and early Nineteen Thirties he was a member of the United States delegations at disarmament and other special conferences. the defeat of France in World War II he was counselor of the United States Embassy in Vichy from October, 1941, to November, 1942.
